### A Year Ago: THE CHALLENGE

Trees Atlanta's mission is to improve our urban environment by planting and conserving trees along streets and in other public areas. Since the mid-60's, there had been no concerted effort citywide to plant trees in downtown Atlanta. Therefore, as a new non-profit organization, the challenge Trees Atlanta faced was a large one. It called for creativity, imagination and a lot of hard work. It meant building the Board of Directors by including more business leaders and government officials, identifying the most barren areas of greatest need, having professional plans designed, working closely with utility companies, raising funds, and educating the public about our goals. And, of course, getting the trees properly planted and maintained.

## What Was Accomplished TREES ATLANTA IS ON THE MOVE

Visitors are invariably impressed by how green Atlanta appears from the air. But each year Atlanta loses approxi-But each year Atlanta loses approximately 4,000 trees from its public parks and along city streets. Although city government is able to replace half that number, the net loss — 2,000 trees per year — will have drastic effects.

We take pride that, with wonderful public support, in 1986 Trees Atlanta:


Planted 46 large shade trees in downtown.

- Planted 5 large treed planters downtown.
- Rescued 7 mature pear trees from a street widening project by moving them to Agnes Scott College's campus. Obtained donations of trees worth
- \$7,000 from the Southeastern Nurseryman's Association for planting in city parks.
- Co-sponsored seminar for builders/ developers on tree preservation on construction sites.
- Transformed the Peachtree Street MARTA station from drab gray plywood to a radiant landscape surrounded with trees.
- Designing Master Tree Planting Plan for downtown and midtown Atlanta in cooperation with the Central Area Study II.
- Distributed 3,600 seedling trees —at the Festival of Trees, Dogwood Festival, and at the Historical Society's May Day.
- Gave trees to create "The Grove of Champions" in Piedmont Park to honor Peachtree Road Race Winners.
- Received national media coverage, including United Press International countrywide.
- Invited to speak at National Conference on Urban Forestry given by American Forestry Association.
- Starting a program to recognize champion trees.
- Produced 2 Public Service Announce-ments shown on Atlanta's TV channels. Involved over 460 volunteers in the
